

EVENING PRAYER — RITE TWO Beginning on page 115 BCP — Sunday, March 22, 2020

The Officiant begins the service with this sentence – The officiant will be you or a member of your family.

Officiant: Let my prayer be set forth in your sight as incense, the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice. *Psalm 141:2*

The following Confession of Sin may then be said;

Confession of Sin - Page 116 BCP

The Officiant says to the people

Officiant: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

Officiant and People say together - Page 116 BCP

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

A lay person says the following – Page 80 BCP

Almighty God have mercy on **us**, forgive **us** all **our** sins through **our** Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen **us** in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep **us** in eternal life.

People: Amen.

The Invitatory and Psalter – Page 117 BCP

All stand

Officiant: O God, make speed to save us. **People: O Lord, make haste to help us.**

Officiant and People

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

O Gracious Light - Page 118 BCP

Officiant: Let us say O Gracious Light together.

O gracious light, pure brightness of the everliving Father in heaven, O Jesus Christ, holy and blessed! Now as we come to the setting of the sun, and our eyes behold the vesper light, we sing your praises, O God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. You are worthy at all times to be praised by happy voices, O Son of God, O Giver of Life, and to be glorified through all the worlds.

Psalm 19:1-14 — Page 606 BCP

Officiant: We will read Psalm 19 responsively by whole verse.

The heavens declare the glory of God;* the skies proclaim the work of his hands.

Day after day they pour forth speech;* night after night they reveal knowledge.

They have no speech, they use no words;* no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth,* their words to the ends of the world.

In the heavens God has pitched a tent for the sun; *It is like a bridegroom coming out of his chamber, like a champion rejoicing to run his course. It rises at one end of the heavens and makes its circuit to the other;* nothing is deprived of its warmth.

The law of the LORD is perfect, refreshing the soul;* the statutes of the LORD are trustworthy, making wise the simple.

The precepts of the LORD are right, giving joy to the heart;* the commands of the LORD are radiant, giving light to the eyes.

The fear of the LORD is pure, enduring forever;* the decrees of the LORD are firm, and all of them are righteous.

They are more precious than gold, than much pure gold;* they are sweeter than honey, than honey from the honeycomb.

By them your servant is warned;* in keeping them there is great reward.

But who can discern their own errors?* Forgive my hidden faults.

Keep your servant also from presumptuous sins; may they not rule over me;* then I will be blameless, innocent of great transgression.

May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight,* O LORD, my Rock and my Redeemer.

Psalm 46:1-12 — Page 649 BCP

Officiant: We will read Psalm 46 responsively by whole verse.

God is our refuge and strength,* an ever-present help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear, though the earth be moved* and though the mountains fall into the heart of the sea;

Though its waters roar and foam,* and the mountains quake with their surging.

The Lord of hosts is with us;* the God of Jacob is our stronghold.

There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God,* the holy place where the Most High dwells.

God is within her, she will not fall;* God will help her at break of day.

Nations are in uproar, kingdoms fall; *he lifts his voice, the earth melts.

The Lord Almighty is with us; * the God of Jacob is our stronghold.

Come and see what the Lord has done, * the desolations he has brought on the earth.

He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth; * He breaks the bow and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire.

He says, "Be still, and know that I am God; * I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth."

The Lesson - (4th Lent – Sunday, March 22, 2020 – Pg. 955 BCP)

The Gospel – John 6:27-40

Reader: A reading from the Gospel of John

²⁷ Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For on him God the Father has placed his seal of approval." ²⁸ Then they asked him, "What must we do to do the works God requires?" ²⁹ Jesus answered, "The work of God is this: to believe in the one he has sent." ³⁰ So they asked him, "What sign then will you give that we may see it and believe you? What will you do? ³¹ Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written: 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat."' ³² Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, it is not Moses who has given you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. ³³ For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."

34 "Sir," they said, "always give us this bread."

³⁵ Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. ³⁶ But as I told you, you have seen me and still you do not believe. ³⁷ All those the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never drive away. ³⁸ For I have come down from heaven not to do my will but to do the will of him who sent me. ³⁹ And this is the will of him who sent me, that I shall lose none of all those he has given me, but raise them up at the last day. ⁴⁰ For my Father's will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day." (Silence)

Reader: The Word of the Lord. **People: Thanks be to God.**

The Song of Simeon – Page 120 BCP

Luke 2:29-32

Officiant: Let us say the song of Simeon together:

Lord, you now have set your servant free * to go in peace as you have promised; For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior, * whom you have prepared for all the world to see: A Light to enlighten the nations, * and the glory of your people Israel.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: * as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

The Apostles' Creed — Page 120 BCP

Officiant: Let us say the Apostles' Creed together

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth; I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Prayers – Page 121 BCP

Officiant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Officiant: Let us pray.

Officiant and People

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Suffrage: B — Page 122 BCP

Officiant: That this evening may be holy, good, and peaceful,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That your holy angels may lead us in paths of peace and

goodwill,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That we may be pardoned and forgiven for our sins

and offenses,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That there may be peace to your Church and to the whole

world,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That we may depart this life in your faith and fear, and not be

condemned before the great judgment seat of Christ,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That we may be bound together by your Holy Spirit in the

communion of all your saints, entrusting one another and

all our life to Christ,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Fourth Sunday in Lent – Page 219 BCP

Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be the true bread which gives life to the world: Evermore give us this bread, that he may live in us, and we in him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Ash Wednesday - Page 217 BCP

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

A Collect for Sundays - Page 123 BCP

Lord God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ triumphed over the powers of death and prepared for us our place in the new Jerusalem: Grant that we, who have this day given thanks for his resurrection, may praise you in that City of which he is the light, and where he lives and reigns for ever and ever. **Amen.**

A Collect for Peace — Page 123 BCP

Most holy God, the source of all good desires, all right judgements, and all just works: Give to us, your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, so that our minds may be fixed on the doing of your will, and that we, being delivered from the fear of all enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through the mercies of Christ Jesus our Savior. **Amen.**

A Collect for Aid against Perils - Page 123 BCP

Be our light in the darkness, O Lord, and in your great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of your only Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, Amen.

A Collect for Protection — Page 124 BCP

O God, the life of all who live, the light of the faithful, the strength of those who labor, and the repose of the dead: We thank you for the blessings of the day that is past, and humbly ask for your protection through the coming night. Bring us in safety to the morning hours; through him who died and rose again for us, your Son our Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

A Collect for the Presence of Christ — Page 123 BCP

Lord Jesus, stay with us, for evening is at hand and the day is past; be our companion in the way, kindle our hearts, and awaken hope, that we may know you as you are revealed in Scripture and the breaking of bread. Grant this for the sake of your love. **Amen.**

A Prayer for a Pandemic

May we who are merely inconvenienced remember those whose lives are at stake. May we who have no risk factors remember those most vulnerable. May we who have the luxury of working from home remember those who must choose between preserving their health or making their rent.
