Beginning on page 115 BCP – Wednesday, March 25, 2020

The Officiant begins the service with this sentence – The officiant will be you or a member of your family.

Officiant: Let my prayer be set forth in your sight as incense, the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice. *Psalm 141:2*

The following Confession of Sin may then be said;

Confession of Sin – Page 116 BCP

The Officiant says to the people

Officiant: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

Officiant and People say together – Page 116 BCP

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

A lay person says the following – Page 80 BCP

Almighty God have mercy on **us**, forgive **us** all **our** sins through **our** Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen **us** in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep **us** in eternal life.

People: Amen.

The Invitatory and Psalter – Page 117 BCP

All stand

Officiant: O God, make speed to save us.

People: O Lord, make haste to help us.

Officiant and People

**Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit:
as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.**

O Gracious Light – Page 118 BCP

Officiant: Let us say O Gracious Light together.

O gracious light, pure brightness of the everliving Father in heaven, O Jesus Christ, holy and blessed! Now as we come to the setting of the sun, and our eyes behold the vesper light, we sing your praises, O God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. You are worthy at all times to be praised by happy voices, O Son of God, O Giver of Life, and to be glorified through all the worlds.

The Psalm Appointed – (4th Lent – Wednesday, March 25, 2020 Pg.955 BCP)

Psalm 119:121-144

Officiant: A reading from Psalm 119.

121. I have done what is just and right; do not leave me to my oppressors.
122. Guarantee your servant's well-being; do not let the godless oppress me. 123. My eyes fail from watching for your salvation, and for the fulfillment of your righteous promise. 124. Deal with your servant according

to your steadfast love, and teach me your statutes. 125. I am your servant; give me understanding, so that I may know your decrees. 126. It is time for the LORD to act, for your law has been broken. 127. Truly I love your commandments more than gold, more than fine gold. 128. Truly I direct my steps by all your precepts; I hate every false way. 129. Your decrees are wonderful; therefore my soul keeps them. 130. The unfolding of your words gives light; it imparts understanding to the simple. 131. With open mouth I pant, because I long for your commandments. 132. Turn to me and be gracious to me, as is your custom toward those who love your name. 133. Keep my steps steady according to your promise, and never let iniquity have dominion over me. 134. Redeem me from human oppression, that I may keep your precepts. 135. Make your face shine upon your servant, and teach me your statutes. 136. My eyes shed streams of tears because your law is not kept. 137. You are righteous, O LORD, and your judgments are right. 138. You have appointed your decrees in righteousness and in all faithfulness. 139. My zeal consumes me because my foes forget your words. 140. Your promise is well tried, and your servant loves it. 141. I am small and despised, yet I do not forget your precepts. 142. Your righteousness is an everlasting righteousness, and your law is the truth. 143. Trouble and anguish have come upon me, but your commandments are my delight. 144. Your decrees are righteous forever; give me understanding that I may live.

The Gospel – Mark 8:11-26

Reader: A reading from the Gospel of Mark

The Demand for a Sign

11. The Pharisees came and began to argue with him, asking him for a sign from heaven, to test him. 12. And he sighed deeply in his spirit and said, "Why does this generation ask for a sign? Truly I tell you, no sign will be given to this generation." 13. And he left them, and getting into the boat again, he went across to the other side. The Yeast of the Pharisees and of

Herod. 14. Now the disciples had forgotten to bring any bread; and they had only one loaf with them in the boat. 15. And he cautioned them, saying, "Watch out—beware of the yeast of the Pharisees and the yeast of Herod." 16. They said to one another, "It is because we have no bread." 17. And becoming aware of it, Jesus said to them, "Why are you talking about having no bread? Do you still not perceive or understand? Are your hearts hardened? 18. Do you have eyes, and fail to see? Do you have ears, and fail to hear? And do you not remember? 19. When I broke the five loaves for the five thousand, how many baskets full of broken pieces did you collect?" They said to him, "Twelve." 20. "And the seven for the four thousand, how many baskets full of broken pieces did you collect?" And they said to him, "Seven." 21. Then he said to them, "Do you not yet understand?" Jesus Cures a Blind Man at Bethsaida. 22. They came to Bethsaida. Some people brought a blind man to him and begged him to touch him. 23. He took the blind man by the hand and led him out of the village; and when he had put saliva on his eyes and laid his hands on him, he asked him, "Can you see anything?" 24. And the man looked up and said, "I can see people, but they look like trees, walking." 25. Then Jesus laid his hands on his eyes again; and he looked intently and his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly. 26. Then he sent him away to his home, saying, "Do not even go into the village." (*Silence*)

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Song of Simeon – Page 120 BCP

Luke 2:29-32

Officiant: Let us say the song of Simeon together:

Lord, you now have set your servant free * to go in peace as you have promised; For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior, * whom you have prepared for all the world to see: A Light to enlighten the nations, * and the glory of your people Israel.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: * as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

The Apostles' Creed – Page 120 BCP

Officiant: Let us say the Apostles' Creed together

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth; I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Prayers – Page 121 BCP

Officiant : The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Officiant : Let us pray.

Officiant and People

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Suffrage: B – Page 122 BCP

Officiant: That this evening may be holy, good, and peaceful,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That your holy angels may lead us in paths of peace and goodwill,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That we may be pardoned and forgiven for our sins
and offenses,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That there may be peace to your Church and to the whole
world,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That we may depart this life in your faith and fear, and not be
condemned before the great judgment seat of Christ,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Officiant: That we may be bound together by your Holy Spirit in the
communion of all your saints, entrusting one another and
all our life to Christ,

People: We entreat you, O Lord.

Fourth Sunday in Lent – Page 219 BCP

Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven
to be the true bread which gives life to the world: Evermore give us this
bread, that he may live in us, and we in him; who lives and reigns with you
and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. ***Amen.***

Ash Wednesday – Page 217 BCP

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive
the sins of all who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite
hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our
wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission
and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with
you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. ***Amen.***

***A Collect for Sundays* – Page 123 BCP**

Lord God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ triumphed over the powers of death and prepared for us our place in the new Jerusalem: Grant that we, who have this day given thanks for his resurrection, may praise you in that City of which he is the light, and where he lives and reigns for ever and ever.

Amen.

A Collect for Peace – Page 123 BCP

Most holy God, the source of all good desires, all right judgements, and all just works: Give to us, your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, so that our minds may be fixed on the doing of your will, and that we, being delivered from the fear of all enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through the mercies of Christ Jesus our Savior. **Amen.**

A Collect for Aid against Perils – Page 123 BCP

Be our light in the darkness, O Lord, and in your great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of your only Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

A Collect for Protection – Page 124 BCP

O God, the life of all who live, the light of the faithful, the strength of those who labor, and the repose of the dead: We thank you for the blessings of the day that is past, and humbly ask for your protection through the coming night. Bring us in safety to the morning hours; through him who died and rose again for us, your Son our Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

A Collect for the Presence of Christ – Page 123 BCP

Lord Jesus, stay with us, for evening is at hand and the day is past; be our companion in the way, kindle our hearts, and awaken hope, that we may know you as you are revealed in Scripture and the breaking of bread. Grant this for the sake of your love. **Amen.**

A Prayer for a Pandemic

May we who are merely inconvenienced remember those whose lives are at stake. May we who have no risk factors remember those most vulnerable.

May we who have the luxury of working from home remember those who must choose between preserving their health or making their rent. May we who have the flexibility to care for our children when their schools close remember those children who will go hungry with no school meals.
